

Growing Importance of CalFresh in the Safety Net


Percent Change in Number of Cases–Baseline Year 2007

Sources of income among SNAP participants in HHs with children




- No income

- Earnings, no cash assistance




Cash Assistance Is Even Less Important in Other States

CalFresh Growth Slower Among Cases with Aided Adults and Children

In California, cases containing only adults nearly tripled, 2000-2009



Recent Policy Changes in California

- Our cross-state research indicates that several recently adopted policies increase participation:
 - Expansions of categorical eligibility
 - Elimination of fingerprinting
- Although no discernible difference between states with quarterly and semi-annual (simplified) reporting
- Thus expectation that California's participation will now more closely resemble the nation's
 - Demographic differences still play a role





Review

- SNAP responsive to the recession both in California and nationally
- CalFresh caseload is diverse, and recent past growth was uneven
 - Eligible children and adult households grew more slowly
 - Among these "mixed age" households,
 CalWORKs share is shrinking while those with earnings and with no income are growing
- Expect that several recent policy changes will partly close California's participation gap
