Direct Certification Facts


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School Meal Basics

- All public schools can operate the federal school lunch and school breakfast programs.
- Low-income students are eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals.
- Participating schools receive a federally funded reimbursement for each meal served. Schools receive the highest reimbursement for meals served to the lowest-income students.
- California schools receive a state-funded reimbursement for meals served to lower-income students. The federal reimbursement is several times larger than the state -- both are vital to the school meal programs.



Determining Student Eligibility


Two processes are used to determine students' eligibility for free or reduced-price school meals.

- Certification: school districts primarily use household applications (online or paper) and direct certification (details below) to deem students eligible for free or reduced-price school meals.
- **Verification**: school districts verify the accuracy of a certain percentage of household applications used for certification.

Direct Certification

Direct certification is an efficient method for schools to determine students' eligibility for free school meals without distributing, collecting, or processing household applications. All school districts that operate a federal school meal program are required by federal law to directly certify students living in households that receive CalFresh benefits. California also directly certifies students living in CalWORKs households. Direct certification utilizes data matching: schools' student enrollment files are matched against CalFresh and CalWORKs records.

Benefits for Low-Income Students & Families

Direct certification means low-income students are...

- More likely to be enrolled to receive free school meals.
- Enrolled to receive free school meals without a redundant household application.
- More likely to participate in the school meal programs.

Benefits for Schools

Direct certification helps school districts...

- → Increase efficiency by not having to (1) distribute, collect, or process school meal applications for students who are directly certified, or (2) undertake verification for directly certified students.
- → Identify low-income students for the purposes of school meals and LCFF.

Direct Certification in California

During the 2012-13 school year, California directly certified 76% of students living in households that participated in CalFresh. That fell short of the current federal performance standard (90%).

- California can improve the state's direct certification rate by optimizing the process by which data is matched between student enrollment files and CalFresh/CalWORKs records.
- California can also make more students eligible for direct certification by applying for federal authority (via available demonstration projects) to utilize Medi-Cal data in the matching process.
