

## California Hunger Action Coalition (CHAC) 2021 Policy Agenda — Virtual Hunger Action Lobby Week

### **COVID-19 Response & Recovery — Fight Hunger & Poverty!**

### **Emergency Food Funding**

- Bolster the Emergency Food System in the COVID-19 Crisis & Beyond: 1) \$110 million one-time: Emergency Food Boxes (Sen. Laird, Asm. Wicks); 2) \$32 million one-time: Climate & Disaster Resilience (Sen. Newman, Asm. Villapudua); and 3) \$150 million one-time: Capacity Enhancements
- SB 240 (Eggman) Farm to Food Bank Tax Credit Support farmers and reduce food waste by extending the tax credit for donations to 2027 for healthy California grown foods (budget request by Sen. Eggman, Asm. Levine).

### **Immigrant Food Access**

- **AB 221 (Santiago)** Provide immediate, one-time Emergency Food Benefits for immigrants adversely affected by the COVID-19 Pandemic and excluded from federal aid because of immigration status. (also budget request).
- SB 464 (Hurtado) Food for All Campaign Create an equitable nutrition safety net by providing permanent nutrition benefits for all those ineligible for CalFresh solely due to immigration status (also budget request).

### **Older Adults**

- Enact the vision outlined in the Master Plan for Aging to Prevent Poverty and Hunger for SSI recipients: 1) Include SSI recipients in all future Golden State Stimulus payments; 2) Restore SSP grants so that they meet the Elder Economic Index; and 3) Fulfill the "hold harmless" goal of the Supplemental Nutrition Benefit and Transitional Nutrition Benefit by preventing recipients from churning off the program and by providing replacement benefits during disasters.
- **SB 107 (Wiener): CalFresh—Simpler for Seniors** Simplify the CalFresh application for older adults and people with disabilities. Make it easier to complete the application and other forms by phone (also budget request).

### End Child Hunger

 SB 364 (Skinner) School Meals for All – Make significant strides toward a hunger-free future for our children. Provide free school meals to all students without burdensome applications, shame, or stigma. Support farmers through grants for school nutrition workers to prepare fresh California foods. Establish the Better Out of School Time (BOOST) program to ensure children have food aid when schools are closed during breaks and disasters.

### **Increase CalFresh Benefit Adequacy**

• **California Nutrition Incentive Program (Budget Request**) \$20 million in additional supplemental benefits for CalFresh participants purchasing fresh fruit and vegetables at Certified Farmers' Markets.
